# Farmer's Market

In January, the clubs expressed interest in having a table at the Farmer's Market for 4-H members to sell any items made from their projects, as well as promote fair, the livestock sale, Expo, and 4-H as a whole. The sky is the limit as far as project items which could be sold at the Market. Well, not really the sky, as the items must be homegrown or homemade. But that could include photography, sewing, baked goods, veggies, cut flowers, leather craft, wood working, or eggs, to name a few. You get the idea! The Market runs from July 10 to October 4, so that gives plenty of time and opportunity to produce items for sale, even after Fair.

The Market provides a community service opportunity for clubs as volunteers are needed to provide a children's activity and help the Market Manager set up and take down. Club leaders agreed that each club would take a date to provide volunteers (although members could show up and sell their project items any time). The Market agreed to provide a booth and waive the vendor fee. You will notice the sign-up doesn't include Oct 4, as that is the Fall Festival which will have plenty of activities so an additional children's activity booth isn't needed.

So now we are looking for clubs to choose their dates and children's activities. So far, only Sheridan Livestock and Canyon Livestock, as well as Justin Hope, have signed up. August 28th already has a zucchini derby scheduled, so whichever club signs up for the date should simply provide items with which to help kids make race cars out of zucchini. And, of course, run the races! (They will either bring their own zucchini or be able to purchase one from a vendor.) On the attached schedule, there is a list of recommended activities to help inspire you.

On the day of the Market, please arrive around 3:30 or so and check in with Bonnie Gregory, the Market Manager. Don't forget the 4-H banner and canopy from the Extension Office. Additionally 12 seniors from the entire state of Wyoming are chosen to go on a trip to Raton, New Mexico, based on a points system from placing in the top 10 in each discipline. This year Johnathan Haugen and Justin Beutler gained enough points and qualified to go on this trip. This is one of the highest honors in Wyoming Shooting Sports. Sheridan County was well represented and the youth did an amazing job and received numerous awards for their hard work.

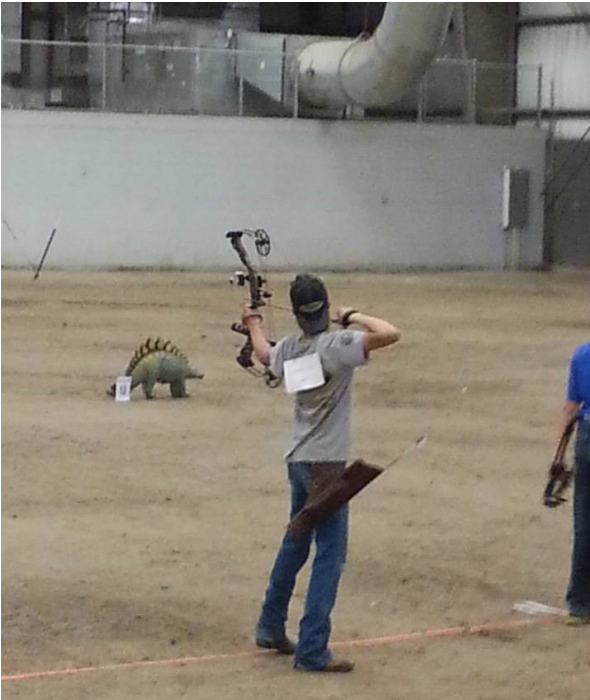

#### What is Fairness?

Every one has heard the words: It's not fair! But what does it mean to be fair? What is fairness, after all? Here are three different ideas about fairness:

~SAMENESS: There is the fairness where everything is equal. So everyone pays the same price for a theater ticket, whether a child, an adult or a senior citizen. No one has more than another.

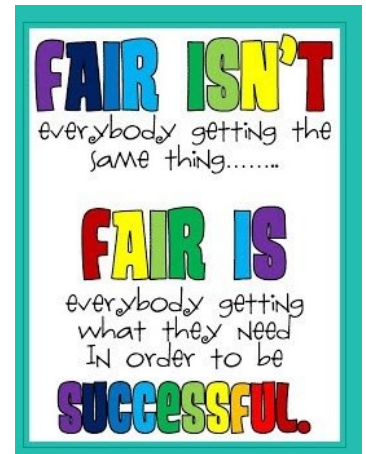
~DESERVEDNESS: In this notion of fairness you get what you deserve. If you work hard, you succeed and keep all that you earn. Fairness means keeping what you deserve and deserving nothing if you have not earned it. The hardest working, most diligent, have more because of their character; the lazy, indifferent have less. This is fairness as individual freedom.

~NEED: The third idea of fairness is that those who have

### Fairness Activity Corner?

#### Supplies:

- Paper; pencils or pens

#### Directions:

Read the following scenario: A student is playing catcher in a softball game. Another student on the opposite team runs to home plate after his teammate hits the ball. As the runner slides into home plate, the catcher catches the ball and tags him. The runner says he is "safe." The catcher says he is "out." Fans sitting on one side agree with the runner. Those on the other side agree with the catcher. Who is correct?

Solicit answer.

#### Processing:

Explain: Either of the players might be correct because they saw the throw from different points of view. Then ask students to help define "point of view." How could each player act more fairly if he considered that everyone had a different point of view? Suggest: The players might have been more willing to accept the other's opinion. Or they could have decided to have the hitter bat again. Or simply accept the rules of the game and the umpire has the final say. Everyone has his or her own view of things. Sometimes things are clearly right or wrong, other times it is not so clear cut. Conclude by having the youth write the story from another person's point of view that would be at the game. Discuss their stories.
