Zombie Escape

For: Creative Problem Solving & Collaboration Skills

What You'll Need: 1 rope, 1 key, and 5-10 puzzles or clues, depending on how much time you want to spend on the game

Instructions: Gather the team into a conference room or other empty space and "lock" the door. Beforehand, select one team member to play the zombie — dead eyes, arms outstretched, muttering "brains" and all. The volunteer zombie will be tied to the rope in the corner of the room, with 1 foot of leeway. Once the game starts, every five minutes the rope restraining the hungry zombie is let out another foot. Soon, the zombie will be able to reach the living team members, who will need to solve a series of puzzles or clues to find the hidden key that will unlock the door and allow them to escape before it's too late.

Good judges will want to see that you have learned more than just how to make a project. They want to see evidence of the Do, Reflect, Apply! You DO your project prior to fair, but interview judging then gives you a chance to REFLECT on your project. You get to tell about what you did, how you did as well as what went good or not so good along the way. You also get to tell them what you learned from your experience and how you might APPLY what you learned to shape new goals for the future.

Why is experiential learning so important? In order to retain the most from what you learned, you need to practice by doing and then teach others! So, during interview judging, judges may ask questions that help you to think through what you did in your project as well as describing the steps along the way. In turn, that helps you better retain what you have learned.

Interview Judging

Questions you might be asked

- What did you think you might learn from taking this project?
- What did you like most about this project? Least?
- Did anyone help you decide what your project might be?
- What new things did you learn?
- How do you plan to use what you made?
- What would you like to learn next year?
- What was the most difficult part of your project?
- What other things did you do in this project?
- What did you learn about yourself?
- What did you learn about your decision making skills?

There will be a vet check of all animals except for horses done before you will be allowed to get on the grounds. The vets will be stationed by the pavilion. Please get all animals checked before entering.

Also there will be mandatory picture taking times for the sale pictures. Pictures will be taken during the beef show (for beef, sheep and goats). Pictures for all pigs will be taken Saturday August 6th from 12-3:30 . If you do not get your pictures taken during this time you will not be allowed to sell.

Step 1: Go to <http://www.sheridancountyfair.fairentry.com> Use your 4-honline log in to sign up. If you don't have a log in you can create one.

Step 2: (Only if not in 4Honline) Click Register an exhibitor. Enter an individual, enter the name, date of birth and gender. Enter address and phone number

Step 3: Put all entries into computer. Select club or FFA chapter. Click continue. Please note there is no payment required it is just a step in the program

Step 4: Once at the payment tab make sure your entries are correct and click submit

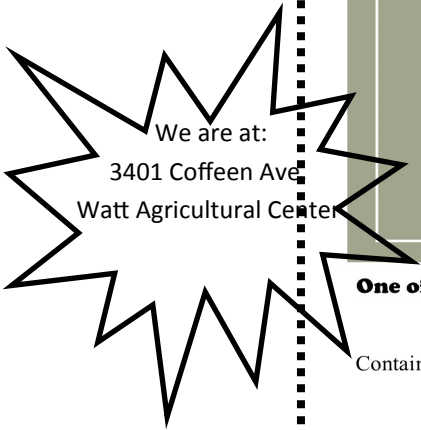
