Another upcoming important date to remember is Tagging day for pigs, sheep and goats. This will happen from 8-11am May 30th. If you own these animals and would like show them in the market class you need to get your animal tagged. Due to the swine disease SECD, there will be some precautions taken. If you are bringing in a pig that came from out of state that has been in Wyoming less than 30 days as of May 30th, a health certificate is required for that animal. At the time of tagging you will receive a swine exhibition declaration. You will need to fill one of these out and bring it with you everywhere you take your pig including jackpots and county fair. If you don't want to bring your pig into town, or you will be gone tagging day, please call the office and make an appointment to get your animal tagged.

In April 4-H members gathered to compete in Sheridan County 4-H's First Annual Mini Showcase Showdown. This contest consisted of a robotics competition, food cook-off, and presentation competition.

The robotics contest consists of two sections. The first is the construction contest. This year the theme for this part of the contest is agriculture equipment. Members must build a robot that has a new and innovative design that enhances the agriculture industry. The second part of the competition is the sumo competition where members must build and program a robot that will push another robot out of the four foot battle ring. Trace Szekula took first place in the construction contest. In the sumo contest Riley Hauf took first, Trace Szekula won second place and John Lenzi came in third.

In the food cook-off members must work in teams of 2-3 people and are given a list of ingredients to choose from and one hour to complete a recipe of their choosing. Based on their age group members must include a certain number of ingredients from the given list. Juniors (8-10 year olds) must include 2 ingredients, intermediates (11-13 year olds) must include 3 ingredients, and seniors (14-18 year olds) must include 5 ingredients. This year's mini showcase food cook-off champions are Brenna Hauf and Grace Bailey with their fruit pizza.

The presentation contest is a contest for members to get creative with their public speaking skills. Members pick a topic and present for a certain amount of time based on their age division. This year we had 10 really great presentations! In the junior age division Grace Hinton was first place with her presentation on chickens, Rudi Balstad came in second with her presentation on guinea pigs and Nathan Shaw received a purple ribbon for his presentation on photography. In the intermediate age division Michael Shaw was champion with his presentation on how to build a mattress spring cannon, Jentry Reid was reserve with her presentation on the acidy level of beverages, team Grace Bailey and Brenna Hauf received a purple ribbon for their presentation of making apple swans and Colter Sharp received a blue ribbon for his presentation on Iran. In the senior age division Emma Balstad was the champion with her presentation on pie crust, Kaitlin Shaw was reserve champion with her presentation on sour dough and John Lenzi received a purple ribbon for his presentation on cutworms.

A special thank you to Sandy Koltiska and Carolyn Benepe for judging the food cook-off, Commissioner Terry Cram and Mayor John Heath for judging the presentation contest, and Thomas Shaffer for judging the robotics competition. First place winners received \$15 and second place winners received \$10 sponsored by the Sheridan County 4-H Council We look forward to growing this event and hosting it again next year!!



Starting this year you will be required to turn in a record book for your livestock for the current year, in order to sell in the sale next year.


If you are showing an animal through 4-H you will be required to turn in a portfolio for the current 4-H year to the extension office by September 14, 2015.


