Workshops/ booths: We will be setting up booths that are divided up by projects. (i.e. photography, leather craft, outdoor skills, animal science, etc.) we are looking for youth and adults to host project booths. What do we mean by host a booth? We would like to have a youth and adult at each project booth (you can schedule from 30 minutes or stay the entire 2 hours) that knows a little bit about the project and can answer questions about it. We are also hoping that we can offer some hands-on activities. Ex: the leather craft booth will have leather craft tools and scrap leather for kids to stamp on OR someone could do a rabbit demonstration and talk about their rabbit (or dog, or cat, or chicken, etc....) If you bring an animal, that animal cannot be left unattended for the entirety of the expo and the animal must stay in the designated area until you take it home. Clubs responsibilities: Help us get the word out! Tell your neighbors, tell your friends, tell your families, tell everyone that we are going to be showcasing 4-H projects. All of Sheridan County residents can come support 4-Hers and learn more about what our organization is by venturing through our project booths and participating in hands-on activities; all for the cost of a can of food per person at the door. We also need clubs to help set-up starting at Noon the day of the Expo. If you need more information about set up please call or text Wendy Hope @ 461-0074. On Achievement Day the clubs will need to provide a tri-fold presentation board with your club information and photos. Information that should be listed should include: Club meeting information (this includes time and place that you meet) key contact people, club officers, club members, community service projects, educational goals, project emphasis and any other pertinent information that newcomers to 4-H might want to know to decide what club they would like to join.

Family responsibilities: We will be doing a bake sale to raise money for our 4-H organization. Money raised will go to project enhancement, youth scholarships, and youth travel. We are asking that every family bring at least one batch of baked goods (but we will happily accept more batches if your family is willing to donate more). Since a big part of being a 4-H member is living a healthy lifestyle we recommend that you choose a healthier option for bake goods. For example baking whole wheat bread instead of white bread. Ghana International Exchange Opportunity

The American Youth Leadership Program (AYLP) with Ghana will offer 20 youth and 2 adults the opportunity to explore the vast historical and cultural traditions of Ghana. The AYLP with Ghana is designed to advance mutual understanding between the people of the United States and Ghana, prepare youth leaders to become responsible citizens, spark an interest in learning about foreign cultures, and develop a cadre of Americans with cultural understanding who are able to compete effectively in the global economy. The program will include a pre-trip orientation on the campus of the University of Wyoming (June 2015), four week cultural trip to Ghana July 2015. Exact trip dates will be determined once flight schedules are confirmed. A follow-on project will be carried out in each participant's local community following the exchange trip. The educational theme for AYLP with Ghana will focus on nutrition and food security with educational activities concentrating on how marketing affects decision making, sustainable food production, and food security for school children.

Participant safety is one of the highest priorities in the American Youth Leadership Program. The U.S. Department of State and the University of Wyoming 4-H continuously monitor conditions affecting participant health and safety in the host country. National 4-H Conference

National 4-H Conference is held the first week of April in Washington D.C. This is the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture's premiere youth development opportunity. Young people assist in the development of recommendations to help guide 4-H Youth Development programs nationally and in their communities. This is a working conference and delegates prepare in advance, attend workshops and develop recommendations during the conference, and, afterwards report accomplishments to the USDA they have achieved as a result of the conference.

Youth serving on the State 4-H Leadership Team will receive a scholarship towards the cost of this trip if they would like to attend. While funding support cannot be guaranteed, all youth between the ages of 15 & 18 are encouraged to apply for selection as a delegate. Interested youth will complete an application and interview sometime in November. In the event donor funds are available for financial support beyond the scholarships provided to the Leadership Team members, qualified delegates may compete for various levels of funding support.

Citizenship Washington Focus

Citizenship Washington Focus (CWF) is held each June in Washington D.C. Delegates will learn about the democratic process, meet new people, see the sights of Washington D.C., meet Wyoming's U.S. Congressional Representatives, and experience our national government from a new perspective. Interviews are held in conjunction with the Wyoming 4-H Showcase Showdown held in June.

MONDAY-November 24th, 2014 –6pm-8pm *Watt Ag. Center,* Room 131: Cover facilities and basic health care.

January-Saturday Afternoon-TBA-Blue Yonder Farm: Hands on Homestead Cow. Prepare feed, milk the cow, get the milk stored and clean the equipment. February-Saturday Afternoon-TBA Blue Yonder Farm: Rotate milk out of storage, learn what things could be made from it and how. We will use store bought cream to make butter (sorry folks the darn USDA rules won't let us use our own).

WEDNESDAY-March 25th, 2015 – 6pm-8pm- Watt Ag. Center, Room 131. We will make simple soft cheese and bring all the info together in a summary (again we will use store bought milk.... That darn USDA...)

September 2015-August 2016- Will offer this beginner program and "Phase II-So you want to have a Homestead Cow but do you buy a calf, a heifer, or a cow already broke?"

We should all be Caring!

Why do people show consideration, kindness, compassion and generosity to others? Some help others because it makes them feel good. Some show concern because everybody else seems to. Some show kindness to avoid embarrassment, to earn recognition, to relieve quilt, or because it hurts them to see other people hurting. Genuine, selfless concern for others is a sign of ethical maturity. A big part of maturity is the ability to think and care about someone besides oneself. Selfish motives and selfish actions are childish motives and childish actions. Self-centered people tend to treat others simply as instruments of their own ends and rarely feel an obligation to be honest, loyal, fair or respectful. Caring people, on the other hand, have progressed

from selfish to selfless, from inwardfocused to outward- focused, from meminded to we-minded, and from a giveme approach to a give-you approach.

Caring requires us to be as considerate, kind, compassionate and generous as our duties and responsibilities permit. But sometimes even love has to be tough. Sometimes really caring requires difficult decisions that are unpleasant for a stakeholder initially, but best for him or her in the long run. Sometimes responsibility seems to conflict with caring.

Caring Do's

- Show you care about others through kindness, caring, generosity and compassion.
- Live by the Golden Rule . . .
 treating others the way you want them to treat you.
- Think how every decision, word or action will impact every stakeholder.

Caring Don'ts

A caring person lives with these reminders:

- ♥ Don't be selfish!
- ♥ Don't be mean!
- Don't be cruel!
- Don't be insensitive to the feelings of others!

Materials: Two large clear drinking glasses, blue food coloring, bleach.

Procedures:

- Fill one of the glasses about a quarter full of water.
- Fill the other glass a little more than half with bleach
- Put one or two drops of food coloring into the glass of water.
- 4. Stir the water to distribute the color.

4-H Activity: The Color of Caring

- 5. Explain that the blue water represents how someone who is hurting, sad, or lonely might feel on the inside. You've probably all heard the phrase "feeling blue." But, when we take the time to be caring and kind to someone who is sad, we can make a difference in their lives.
- 6. (Hold up the glass of bleach and say that this represents "caring." Then pour it into the colored water.) By caring for others, look at the difference we can make in how they feel.
- Watch as the water slowly starts to turn back to clear. (While you wait, it will take about a minute, you can discuss ways that we can care for others.)
- Clearly, you can make a difference by caring for others!

UW 4-H is using a software program called 4HOnline for our data management. Our annual federal reporting requirements dictate enrollment in 4-H every year. If you use technology a lot, the process for enrollment will be rather simple.
