February Council Minutes 2018

January minutes were read. Susie moved to correct the name of the program Wyotana Grizzlies participated in to Foster Parent Exchange and then she accepted the minutes. Heidi seconded. Motion carried.

Heidi gave treasurers report in Barbara's absence. There were 3 deposits made in the amount of \$1559.00. 3 bills have been paid with a total amount of \$460.76. Susie moved to approve the amounts of the 3 bills and Donna seconded the motion. Motion carried. Kandra mentioned that there is an outstanding bill in the amount of \$460 in carnival expenses. There has been \$420 in cookbook sale income. Meat sale profits from Jr Leaders of \$703.50 has been paid back into the account. There was a slight discrepancy in the treasurer's report and the financial report that Kanda has. Will clarify at March meeting.

Roll Call of Clubs

Big Horn Cowboys discussed Carnival at their last meeting. They have also started to discuss record books. Will be meeting next week. They had two different members give presentations.

Renegades met last week. They have received their first donation of \$50 from Harker Mellinger. They had three different committees go to three different business. One committee went to West View Healthcare. They would like to make that a monthly community service event. They also went to Salvation Army. They helped the process in the back of the warehouse. They learned that Salvation Army donates produce on Monday, Wednesday and Fridays. This month their committee will be going to the Senior Center. Their carnival Booth will be Brain Game Wonders. Their next meeting will be right before Carnival and they will be building their booth.

Sheridan Livestock met yesterday and discussed their carnival booth and details about their raffle basket. They will be meeting the week before Carnival to work on decorations. Their next meeting will be the Sunday after Carnival.

Tongue River Roundup met yesterday and finalized their booth decorations and made valentines.

Shooting Sports is going well. They started two weeks ago. Kids are doing very well this year. They have some new kids that are already advanced from air soft rifles.

Wyotana Grizzlies met the first Tuesday of the month and made a ton of treats for the animals at the Dog and Cat Shelter. They met there last Saturday to give their treats to the Shelter. Made cat box toys for the new cats when they get out of quarantine. They will finalize booth schedule when they meet in March.

New Club Black Tooth Mustangs. Things are going well. They have a lot of kids interested in Rocketry. They made posters for Carnival at last meeting. They have an overall young club with a total of 10 to 12 kids with lots of cloverbuds.

Awards committee has received some donations. Vicki and Marci went through the award letter and sent out 620 award letters. At this time the fairgrounds award account has \$72 in it, we need close to \$7,000 for fair awards. Josie and Brayton Ankney have both donated towards horticulture, wood working and sports fishing.

Overall prize will be a buckle with average amount of \$100. Champion division will be \$25, Class divisions will be from \$5 to \$10. There will be no special reserve awards except in showmanship and Round Robin. They are looking into the possibility of engraved cups or water bottles.

Indoor Committee met today and discussed Mini Showcase Showdown. This will take place on April 20th and 21st. There will be there an email going out to all members soon. Food list is out and available to seen in the newsletter. Deadline for applications to participate is April 6th. Indoor members are also requesting that leaders let them know if there is a project they know of that needs a leader. They are currently working on Rocketry and Wood working. We are still in need of a photography leader. Judge recruitment will be starting soon for fair.



The last sewing workshop went very well. They had over 12 kids show up. Their next meeting will include quilting and sewing. Crystal does quilting and Donna helps with sewing projects.

Jr Leaders are working on carnival prize booth, photography booth and the dance. Kaycee, Elsa and Samantha will be doing PSA soon for carnival. They are encouraging people to bring a can of food when they come to the dance. Next meeting will be Feb 19th.

Livestock committee is in the process of setting up mandatory livestock meetings. If a member does not attend then a member will have an additional 10% taken out of their livestock check. Kiel and Jacki Sheldon are donating a heifer to the futurity program. New this year is the new law on swine that all swine coming from out of state needs to be Brucellosis tested and they have to ensure the head is Brucellosis is free. This needs to be done within 30 days of coming to the state. Fitting rules have changed and members of all species need to be fully involved in the care, cleaning of stalls and fitting of all animals they are using at fair, including horse this year. Quality assurance will be mandatory again for all members if they have not already taken it or if they are moving up a division. Haley Timm will be teaching first years and FFA advisor and Justin West will be teaching Intermediates and seniors. Fair books are almost complete. A mock fair book will be handed out, leaders are to look over that and get back to committee if any changes are needed. They are still in need of futurity, cat, dog and pocket pet judges. Beef numbers are down this year to 65. There has been a board of directors set up for construction at the fairgrounds. They are currently looking over bylaws.

The Horse program is rapidly growing. It will be 2.5 days at fair. Starting Tuesday with cattle events then speed events. Wednesday will be all western events and Thursday will be showmanship, halter and English events. All horse members will be informed to let office know if they will need early morning static exhibit times if they are participating in cattle events. Horse committee would like to improve communication with other committees and leaders. They are working on having cattle safety training. Melissa mentioned that they need to have more than one ay to become certified to jump at fair. They are adding an open horse lead line and show event for younger members this year.

Mountain camp committee met two weeks ago. They are working on getting new electrical and RV pads up there. They are updating the le to 50amps plugs outside. They are waiting for Forest Service approval. The camp is booked for the summer.

Kandra has requested that Melissa take over on Scholarships this year. Applications have been sent to eligible recipients. It is required for a leader to write a letter, extension office personnel, and one additional person. A past educator would work.

They are in the application phase of hiring another educator. Hopefully will be final in April or May.

For Carnival. Clubs need to get their booth info back so venue leaders know how to layout the hall.

Advertising is going well. Banner will be up soon. PSA will start within the next few weeks. As soon as raffle tickets are done they will make a Facebook push post. Flyers will be going out to Sheridan County school districts 1, 2, and 3 as soon as they are approved.

Most of the prizes have been ordered, estimated there needs to be approximately \$100 more of prizes ordered. Looking at the possibility of getting Subway, DQ and coffee cards for prizes. Everyone will get a penny prize and token.

Most of the food has been ordered from Bino's and will delivered on Friday to the Exhibit hall. Kandra made a Costco trip. Kentz has said that we can take supplies from kitchen as long as everything gets returned.

Raffle tickets are in printing and should be ready to be picked up on Tuesday or Wednesday.

Kandra passed out a letter from Kentz to help keep rooms at office clean. Supplies has been purchased to help with this.

Cori has printed membership list and project list to be handed to club Leaders. The idea of this is to get kids and parents better prepared for fair. First 5 pages in fair book is vital for parents to read.

Legislators think that State Fair should be self-sustaining and have dropped the budget by \$500,000 this year. We would like to encourage kids to go to their educator and ask if they can go to State Fair this year even if they have received a red ribbon.

Discussed how to get kids to complete their thank you cards at fair. Some suggested that all kids fill out two thank you cards and those would be used at fair. There was a suggestion to have a thank you card booth during static exhibits. This would also give leaders a chance to help teach kids how to write thank you cards. Will discuss this at a later time.

Heidi volunteered to keep record of what ribbon each kid gets at fair.

Susie reminded everyone that she will be having a Dog Show on April 28th. This is a fundraiser for the Dog Program.

On April 8th a preview of pigs will take place from 1–2 pm at the Sheridan County Fairgrounds. Numbers will then be drawn for each pig.



ATTENTION ALL LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS:

Livestock Fitting Rule – All 4-H or FFA members must accompany, care for, groom, fit, and exhibit their own livestock at Sheridan County Fair. However, when needed, any bonafide Sheridan County 4H/FFA Member, parent, leader, or Advisor/Educator may assist with fitting, feeding, general care, and cleaning as long as the 4H/FFA member is present to help, learn, and interact. Assistance from a non-Sheridan County member will not be allowed or tolerated. Violations of this rule must be reported to the Livestock Committee. Two warnings will be given and after that time the particular animal will be disqualified from showing in any classes it's entered in for the fair.




