VET CHECK AND SALE PICTURE TIMES!

There will be a vet check of all animals except for horses done before you will be allowed to get on the grounds. The vets will be stationed by the pavilion. Please get all animals checked before entering.

Also there will be mandatory picture taking times for the sale pictures. Pictures will be taken during the beef show (for beef, sheep and goats). Pictures for all pigs will be taken Saturday August 4th from 12-3:30. If you do not get your pictures taken during this time you will not be allowed to sell.

THANK YOU NOTES!

This year we are requiring all members who sell livestock to bring in a written thank you and stamped envelope to the extension office **within 30 days of the sale**, before we will release your sale check. When you bring in your thank you, you will receive the plaque/picture frame with you and your animal that you will be expected to deliver to your buyer and thank them in person (the plaque will no longer be given out at fair).

Council Minutes

June 11, 2018

Called Meeting to order at 5:30pm by Kandra.

There were no guests present.

Pledges: There were no flags present, so the pledges were dispensed.

May Minutes were read by Tammy. Moved to approve by Barbara and seconded by Chris Lamb.

Treasurer's Report: Current balance in account is \$25,778.22. Outstanding bills to be paid are \$1,817.50 this included \$ 1,657.50 for Chamber bucks for County Shoot and \$160.00 for the WY State 4H Foundation. There was discussion on which line item the money would come out of for the county shoot outstanding balance. Barbara will research this further. Jennifer moved to pay bills as read. Erin seconded the motion. Motion passed.

Club Roll Call:

Big Horn Cowboys were present. Update given by Erin Hinton. Dog and at Shelter work day on June 5th, was a great turn out. They had at least 15 member, parents and siblings. They spent a good amount of time there. Made some signs for the animals, made toys and played with the animals. BBQ afterwards. They will meet again in July.

Canyon Livestock: not present

Critters, Crafts, and Cooking Carol reported. Will have meeting on June 16th. Working on Parli. Pro. Will be at Shiptons on June 23rd running the Hotdog stand for their Big Tent Sale.

Black Tooth Mustangs: They are talking about having a meeting to shoot of Rockets, no date set yet. They will be doing a community service for Prairie Dog Community Hall. No date yet.

Lucky 7: not present

Renegades: Working on Record Book goals for their projects. Some kids have achieved their goals already. Will not have their June meeting at the college in June. Instead it will be held at Marshal Park. They will be going to Westview next week with Goats and Chickens. The club will be working on Rockets In July.

Sheridan Livestock: They did not have a June Meeting due to no kids available to attend.

Shooting Sports: Chris reported that County Shoot went very well. The shooting committee has already met to do some changes for next year. It was a good year overall. Assistance from a non-Sheridan County member will not be allowed or tolerated. *Violations of this rule must be reported to the Livestock Committee. Two warnings will be given and after that time the particular animal will be disqualified from showing in any classes it's entered in for the fair.*

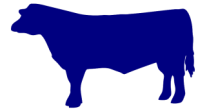

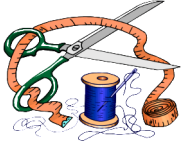

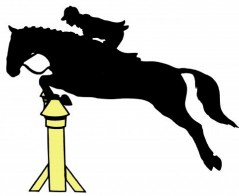

Good judges will want to see that you have learned more than just how to make a project. They want to see evidence of the Do, Reflect, Apply! You DO your project prior to fair, but interview judging then gives you a chance to REFLECT on your project. You get to tell about what you did, how you did as well as what went good or not so good along the way. You also get to tell them what you learned from your experience and how you might APPLY what you learned to shape new goals for the future.

Why is experiential learning so important? In order to retain the most from what you learned, you need to practice by doing and then teach others! So, during interview judging, judges may ask questions that help you to think through what you did in your project as well as describing the steps along the way. In turn, that helps you better retain

- Did anyone help you decide what your project might be?
- What new things did you learn?
- How do you plan to use what you made?
- What would you like to learn next year?
- What was the most difficult part of your project?

- What did you learn about yourself?
- What did you learn about your decision making skills?
