

AQHA PROGRAM PAIRS

YOUNG HORSES AND YOUNG HORSEMEN
FOR GUIDED LEARNING EXPERIENCE

hen Rudi Balstad applied for the American

Quarter Horse Association's Young Horse Development program, nine months of working with a yearling colt sounded like a fun way to learn more about horses and train her own young horse, having raised cows and other animals on their Parkman, Wyoming ranch.

"I have a horse currently, but he's getting old and I always wanted to raise a young horse," Balstad says. "I was looking into it and I thought it sounded really interesting. You learn not only how to train a horse, but you also learn bonding techniques, you learn about yourself and I found that really fascinating."

The idea behind the Young Horse Development Program came in 2011 when a handful of AQHA Ranching Heritage Breeders wanted to find a way to connect their quality yearling horses with deserving youth members in the AQHA.





The AQHA Young Horse Development program requires about 10 hours per week, and at the end of 9 months, the young person owns the horse that's donated by some of AQHA's top breeders.



SHOW-RITE

STRUCTURE

- Toes pointing straight
- Length of stride
- Squareness from blade to foot and from hip to foot.

MUSCLE

- Width in front end
- Width from behind
- Muscle shape down topline

BALANCE


- Silhouette from side view
- Shoulder height higher than hip height on the move
- Extension of head and neck
- Extension or length of hip

STOUTNESS OR FEMININITY

- Bone Size
- Shape of face neck and jaw
- Rib shape
- Length of face and
- Length of hip
- Rib shape
- Underline count and spacing
- Vulva size

FRESHNESS

- Condition or cover over ribs
- Top shape and expression of top
- Freshness and presentation of skin and hair

GENETICS

Does your potential project have the genetic propensity to be competitive?

STRUCTURE

- Width through their chest floor and from behind
- Squareness at the ground

RIB SHAPE

- Round shape through their fore rib (behind the shoulder blade)
- Round shape at their last rib
- The more cylindrical they are, the easier they will feed

MUSCLE

- Shape down their top and out through their hip and hind leg
- Muscle can vary depending on the condition of the animal, example: a thin one will not express as much muscle as they will after they've been fed properly and matured. This is why it's so important to make sure the genetic package includes muscle.


BALANCE

- Proportional in terms of length of spine
- Elevated through their front end
- Proportional in terms of length of hip and length of front end
- Do they offer some eye appeal?

STRUCTURE

- Squareness of feet and legs
- Flexibility, length of stride
- Level topline and hip

MUSCLE

- Width of skeleton
- Width over 13th rib
- Squareness of edges down their top
- Outward shape to stifle

STOUTNESS

- Bone and foot size
- Broad skull shape
- Forearm
- Center body dimension, round rib

BALANCE

- Silhoutte from the side view
- Tall fronted, neck comes out of the top of their shoulder
- Level topline
- Correct bottom line: chest is shallower than rear flank
- Shoulder blade is flat and hip is bigger than shoulder
- Leg wool helps with balance

FRESHNESS

- Appropriate condition or cover over ribs
- Expression of muscle shape
- Tight and smooth hide

If you are signed up for the Self-Determined project, be on the lookout for a mailed packet.

The bright yellow page is due back to the Extension Office by June 1st

Project Guidelines

- 1. Identify a possible topic for your project.
- 2. Complete the Proposed Plan for Approval (**Bright Yellow Paper**) and turn it into your 4-H Educator by June 1st. Your 4-H Educator will take in to consideration 4-H rules and the risk involved with each project before approving your project.
- 3. Once your project is approved, complete the Planning Your Adventure section (Steps 1 through 3) of the guide **(this is coming to you in the mail with the yellow paper)** by discussing and researching your topic, by planning and completing at least two learning experiences, and by planning and completing at least two leadership/citizenship activities.
- 4. Complete the *Conducting Your Adventure* section by identifying and completing three areas of interest and three activities within each area.
- 5. Complete the Reporting Your Adventure section of the Self Determined Project guide.

IMPORTANT

In order to enter a Self Determined Project:

- You MUST have prior approval of your project
- You MUST have your completed Self-Determined packet with your project at fair.

Hosting 4-H Meetings in Light of COVID-19

The health and safety of all 4-H members, volunteers, parents, guests, and staff is the top priority of the Wyoming 4-H Program. To help reduce the risks associated with the spread of COVID-19, the following guidelines from the Wyoming Department of Health and the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) should be followed to protect yourself and others.

- Stay home when sick and avoid contact with other people unless you need medical attention.
- Follow common-sense steps such as washing your hands often and well; covering your coughs and sneezes; and cleaning and disinfecting.
- If soap and water are not readily available, use a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.
- Avoid close contact with people by staying at least 6 feet apart.
- Wear cloth face coverings in public settings where social distancing is difficult to maintain.

To help safeguard the health and safety of our members and volunteers, the following guidelines need to be followed for all 4-H meetings.

Before Your 4-H meeting:

- Ensure that no more than ____ people are in attendance. The number needs to include everyone (volunteers, parents, members, siblings, guest speakers, etc.)
- Inform all possible participants to stay home if they are experiencing any of the symptoms of COVID-19 or have had known contact with anyone with COVID-19 in the last 14 days.
- Inform all possible attendees to stay home if they are considered at high risk themselves or if
 they live or work with individuals at high risk. (age 65+, are immunocompromised, or have
 other health factors identified by the CDC that increase risk if being exposed)
- Create and prepare any signs or documents that will be used at the event communicating procedures like, checking in, information for parents, expected times, etc.
- Wipe down all common surfaces as recommended by the Center for Disease Control (CDC).
 Common surfaces include tables, counters, doorknobs, light switches, countertops, handles, phones, keyboards, toilets, faucets, chairs, etc.

When everyone arrives:

- Have a "check-in" process in place and follow it include providing hand-washing location, hand sanitizer, and directions for where to wait until activity starts to ensure practicing social distancing, etc.
- Take attendance. Be sure to write down the names of EVERYONE that attended and the date.

During the 4-H meeting:

- Maintain social distancing (6 feet) throughout the meeting or activity by households. You may need to be creative with different ice-breaker activities, roll-calls, etc.
- Ensure a protocol is in place and followed for use of any type of equipment. This may require planning of sanitizing equipment between uses. This is especially important for shared equipment like sewing machines, firearms, clippers, pencils, crayons, etc.

After the 4-H meeting:

- Have activities ready for individual youth to do while awaiting their pick-up. These could be handouts, games, etc, that don't involve contact with each other.
- Wipe down all common surfaces with a disinfectant as recommended by the Center for Disease Control (CDC). Common surfaces include tables, counters, doorknobs, light switches, countertops, handles, phones, keyboards, toilets, faucets, chairs, etc.

Preparing facilities for a 4-H meeting:

- Ensure that the size of the room or facility is large enough to allow for the number of expected attendees and in accordance with current Health Orders and County guidelines, this includes space to allow for social distancing.
- Space tables, chairs, shooting points, etc. farther apart to ensure social distancing (at least 6ft. apart).
- Wipe down all common surfaces as recommended by the Center for Disease Control (CDC).
 Common surfaces include tables, counters, doorknobs, light switches, countertops, handles, phones, keyboards, toilets, faucets, chairs, etc.

Should you have food at your meeting?

At this time we recommend food or snacks not be provided as part of 4-H meetings. If you feel
you need to provide food or snacks, please communicate with your 4-H educator on
recommended safety protocols.

Summary

As a volunteer, your health and that of our youth members is of utmost importance and as such some engagement may be minimized at the request of a UW employee or UW 4-H Volunteer based on a health concerns associated with COVID-19.

By following the above best practices, we hope to offer more opportunities for youth to interact face-to-face within the parameters provided by your county health officials. If you have any questions, please contact your UW 4-H Educator for assistance or clarification.
