


Sheridan County 4-H



The bright yellow page is due back to the Extension Office by June 1st

Project Guidelines

- 1. Identify a possible topic for your project.
- 2. Complete the Proposed Plan for Approval (**Bright Yellow Paper**) and turn it into your 4-H Educator by June 1st. Your 4-H Educator will take in to consideration 4-H rules and the risk involved with each project before approving your project.
- 3. Once your project is approved, complete the Planning Your Adventure section (Steps 1 through 3) of the guide **(this is coming to you in the mail with the yellow paper)** by discussing and researching your topic, by planning and completing at least two learning experiences, and by planning and completing at least two leadership/citizenship activities.
- 4. Complete the *Conducting Your Adventure* section by identifying and completing three areas of interest and three activities within each area.
- 5. Complete the Reporting Your Adventure section of the Self Determined Project guide.



Hosting 4-H Meetings in Light of COVID-19

The health and safety of all 4-H members, volunteers, parents, guests, and staff is the top priority of the Wyoming 4-H Program. To help reduce the risks associated with the spread of COVID-19, the following guidelines from the Wyoming Department of Health and the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) should be followed to protect yourself and others.

- Stay home when sick and avoid contact with other people unless you need medical attention.
- Follow common-sense steps such as washing your hands often and well; covering your coughs and sneezes; and cleaning and disinfecting.
- If soap and water are not readily available, use a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.
- Avoid close contact with people by staying at least 6 feet apart.
- Wear cloth face coverings in public settings where social distancing is difficult to maintain.

To help safeguard the health and safety of our members and volunteers, the following guidelines need to be followed for all 4-H meetings.

Before Your 4-H meeting:

- Ensure that no more than ____ people are in attendance. The number needs to include everyone (volunteers, parents, members, siblings, guest speakers, etc.)
- Inform all possible participants to stay home if they are experiencing any of the symptoms of COVID-19 or have had known contact with anyone with COVID-19 in the last 14 days.
- Inform all possible attendees to stay home if they are considered at high risk themselves or if
 they live or work with individuals at high risk. (age 65+, are immunocompromised, or have
 other health factors identified by the CDC that increase risk if being exposed)
- Create and prepare any signs or documents that will be used at the event communicating procedures like, checking in, information for parents, expected times, etc.
- Wipe down all common surfaces as recommended by the Center for Disease Control (CDC).
 Common surfaces include tables, counters, doorknobs, light switches, countertops, handles, phones, keyboards, toilets, faucets, chairs, etc.

When everyone arrives:

- Have a "check-in" process in place and follow it include providing hand-washing location, hand sanitizer, and directions for where to wait until activity starts to ensure practicing social distancing, etc.
- Take attendance. Be sure to write down the names of EVERYONE that attended and the date.

During the 4-H meeting:

- Maintain social distancing (6 feet) throughout the meeting or activity by households. You may need to be creative with different ice-breaker activities, roll-calls, etc.
- Ensure a protocol is in place and followed for use of any type of equipment. This may require
 planning of sanitizing equipment between uses. This is especially important for shared
 equipment like sewing machines, firearms, clippers, pencils, crayons, etc.

After the 4-H meeting:

- Have activities ready for individual youth to do while awaiting their pick-up. These could be handouts, games, etc, that don't involve contact with each other.
- Wipe down all common surfaces with a disinfectant as recommended by the Center for Disease Control (CDC). Common surfaces include tables, counters, doorknobs, light switches, countertops, handles, phones, keyboards, toilets, faucets, chairs, etc.

Preparing facilities for a 4-H meeting:

- Ensure that the size of the room or facility is large enough to allow for the number of expected attendees and in accordance with current Health Orders and County guidelines, this includes space to allow for social distancing.
- Space tables, chairs, shooting points, etc. farther apart to ensure social distancing (at least 6ft. apart).
- Wipe down all common surfaces as recommended by the Center for Disease Control (CDC).
 Common surfaces include tables, counters, doorknobs, light switches, countertops, handles, phones, keyboards, toilets, faucets, chairs, etc.

Should you have food at your meeting?

At this time we recommend food or snacks not be provided as part of 4-H meetings. If you feel
you need to provide food or snacks, please communicate with your 4-H educator on
recommended safety protocols.

Summary

As a volunteer, your health and that of our youth members is of utmost importance and as such some engagement may be minimized at the request of a UW employee or UW 4-H Volunteer based on a health concerns associated with COVID-19.

By following the above best practices, we hope to offer more opportunities for youth to interact faceto-face within the parameters provided by your county health officials. If you have any questions, please contact your UW 4-H Educator for assistance or clarification.

Council minutes for Monday, March 1, 2021 4-H Council (by Donna Birkholz)

The council meeting was called to order at 5:32pm by Erin Hinton. Barb moved to accept the February minutes as written, seconded by Carol and passed.

Treasurer report: Barb notes \$22,547.60 in the bank, \$298.78 outstanding. We have had lots of deposits, including one that was a memorial for Helen Mitchell. \$75.91 in bills to pay. A question about a Sheridan Press photo someone had seen which showed 4-H and FFA receiving a donation. Emily will research it, she did not recollect it. Erin moved that we pay the outstanding bills and that was seconded by Carol, then passed by council.

Club reports

Big Horn Cowboys met at the Exhibit Hall and talked about making lap quilts for the VA. In March, will tour the Little Goose Ranch, and plan to tour the Kendrick Mansion this year. Adopted a highway section to clean. Discussed 4-H Camp community service, and like the idea. One of the recipients of our Treats for Troops packages has asked to Zoom with the kids to thank them.

Renegades - did not meet, will meet 3/19.

Sheridan Livestock - not present.

Wyotana - met at the Exhibit Hall, made Valentines that were delivered to Sugarland. Will meet 3/2 at the Exhibit Hall.

Tongue River - met at the town hall for a movie night with popcorn and pizza. There was good attendance.

Critters, Crafts, and Cooking - met on the first Saturday in February, made a Valentine craft. Will be going to 4-H camp to hang out and work to clean up, but have not set a date for that.

Lucky 7 - Met in February, attendance was lower (at ERA Carroll Realty again). Cleaning up their highway clean-up site in return. Voted to have a pizza party at Scotty's Skate Palace. Chose a different raffle item, a gift certificate for the ice rink for a family to rent and skate, which will be good to be used at some point in the coming year (a private hour at the rink). Decided to get new club shirts, but have members order them rather than paying with club funds.

Junior Leaders - winter retreat is coming Sunday, it will be sledding at the Bowl with burgers/hot dogs/chips/etc. Siblings and parents welcome, there will be snow machines for ferrying kids up the hill. They will hold their Pig Pickin' again this spring, the pig has already been donated. Discussed pairing members who are new to a particular project with a junior leader who's enrolled in that project, as a way to facilitate mentoring.

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Old business:

Leader training will be on April 8th for the county, by Zoom. It will be about the Essential Elements, it will be recorded, and Cori has a list of the leaders who will need to attend to maintain certification.

Council Scholarship Committee recommendation:

There were 4 applicants, all were fantastic with great books, all are good active kids, the committee was impressed and wanted to recommend giving all four \$750. Susie asked if we could afford that. Unclear who spoke next, as it was garbled. Barb then said she believes we have the money in the budget. Melissa asked that we double check. Discussion of historical amounts given commenced. Determined that it had been capped at \$2,500 total, but that we could afford the full amount requested. Melissa moved to give each applicant \$750, seconded by Susie, vote passed by council.

Hat update:

Chandra spoke with them. A website link will go out to everyone so people can preorder the hats after looking at the mock-up.

Raffle:

The office will prep the tickets when they are ready sometime this week. They will be due back to the office with \$\$ on April 2nd. The drawing will be live on April 12th. Distribution: they can be picked up at the office, but leaders can also pick them up and distribute them. There isn't a limit on the number of books that a kid can pick up, but each member should set the goal of selling at least two books of tickets. People should use good judgment about giving out the books to members, if kids have historically sold more of them, they could request more, but it's also a good idea to just have them pick up some to start, then come back for more. Melissa noted that smaller kids receive fewer tickets because they have fewer members so we should make sure that each club has a certain number set aside to ensure smaller clubs receive enough tickets. We will still have seller incentives. The office will look at historicals to ensure that clubs get a base number of tickets. On 4/9 all raffle items need to have been delivered to the office. Very large items (like what Wardells are donating) should coordinate with the office to ensure that they can be handled/hauled into the office safely. Melissa moved to award the same prize amounts for each age category as last year. There was a second, and it passed (Awards: \$40 to first place, \$30 to second place, in each age group).

Crystal asked via chat whether raffle folders will be handed out to leaders, Chandra said they would be, also to include baggies for leaders to put the money in. There is a group helping the office with the raffle. They will be called to help assemble the folders (next week). The group will be contacted with more information when the office has it. My notes showed those members as: Crystal, Jessie, Susie, Melissa.

Donna gave an Indoor report. State Showcase Showdown will be in June, in-person. Therefore the committee wants to hold our Showcase Showdown in-person. It can't be held at the Watt Ag building, so the commmittee is researching a location and will meet via Zoom on March 10th, 5pm, to begin planning more for Showdown, once we have a location set. We will begin recruiting Fair judges after our April meeting.

Awards report from Emily:

The committee has met twice now and has another meeting scheduled. They redid the donor letter, which will go out this week. The wording has been tweaked to reflect that the money donated is to Sheridan County 4-H awards, in support of events like [Showcase Showdown, County Shoot, etc.], as well as County Fair. Hopeful that awareness that there are other events to support will increase interest in donations. Donors can specify where they'd like their donation to go, but we've eliminated the check-boxes. We are using Molly's Silver for the belt buckles, in a variety of styles for the various categories, with the FFA buckles also different from the 4-H buckles in those categories so that members who win both 4-H and FFA for that category don't get identical buckles. We are trying to redo the way Awards thank-yous are done to alleviate awkward Thank-you note situations. Discussed challenges of getting them out to donors and challenges of members who may have learning disabilities struggling to get them written fast enough during Fair.

We'll need to continue to follow our budget. We have a cushion right now and we'll keep that. Emily Wardell and Barb Kepley have been added to the account, and a Paypal function with a QR code is also available so we have options beyond mailing checks, now.

Jackets for Indoor winners – instead of multiple award choices, there will just be one jacket in one color, but that enables a higher quality jacket. The jackets will have an embroidered emblem on the back as well as a 4-H clover, the coats will be in the \$60 range. We will continue to keep the awards equitable between Indoor and Livestock. The Awards committee is working well as as team. Susie asked: Is the committee asking leaders what they want for awards? Answer: Budgets won't change and we'll let leaders handle things.
