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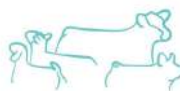

HI 4-H FAMILIES!

My name is Cora Wood, and I am the 2021 Sheridan County Extension intern! 4-H has always been one of my passions, and I am very excited to be a part of your 4-H year! While I am sure that I will have the opportunity to meet you all and spend some time getting to know you, let me tell you a little bit about me and my journey with 4-H.

I started being involved in 4-H as soon as I was old enough to join. At the time, my family and I were living in Encampment, Wyoming, and I was able to take my projects to the Carbon County Fair. My favorite projects were my horses, but I was also involved in Shooting Sports and Market Sheep. In 2010, I was the Carbon County Fair and Rodeo Princess, and I loved being able to meet new people and share my excitement for my projects and the fair itself! Then, in the fall of 2011, my dad took a different ranch job further north, and we moved to Big Horn County, Montana.

As a part of the County Ambassador team, I had the opportunity to promote 4-H involvement in the community, travel around the state to leadership camps, collaborate with other county ambassadors, and workshop leadership methods that we would take back home to share with our local clubs. We also organized an annual Pancake Feed in February that feeds veterans, law enforcement, and active military members for free and raises money for future community service projects.

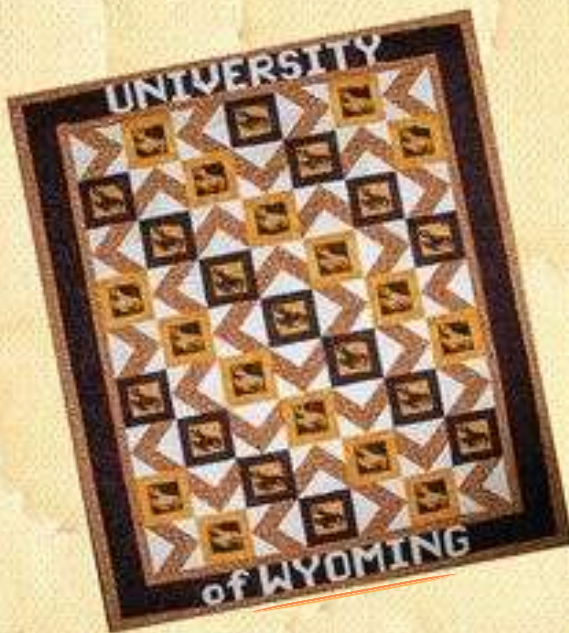

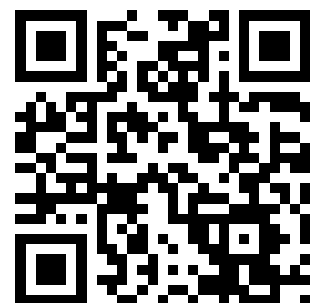

PROJECT LEARNING

Broody is a term used to describe breeding females that are more massive in their look. It relates to boldness of rib and depth of body together. Often times when the word "broody" is used, it will not be describing the deep bodied female that is flat ribbed or the bold bodied female that is shallow bodied, but instead one that is both. In addition, broody females should also be wide made and have natural width and thickness.

Livestock Judging

"Practical" is used predominately in cattle, specifically steers, and relates to feeding ability. A steer that is more practical will be bolder sprung and deeper in his rib design. This allows that animal to more appropriately consume feed and convert it into finish. More practical animals that are bolder sprung are also typically able to put more muscle on their skeleton. More practical animals will usually balance better than those that are harder doing. "Easy feeding" is another term used to describe this.

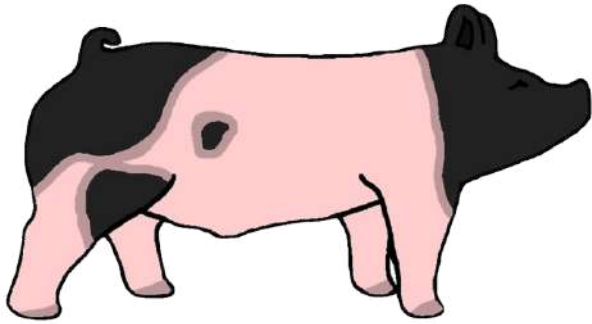
The term **plainer necked** can be utilized on all livestock- both breeding and market. Plainer necked is a negative term. Animals that are plainer necked are typically shorter, thicker, and courser about their neck. It's important to note that this is a negative purely for ascetic reasons, and will not affect an animal from a functionality standpoint.

The term **honest** in her breeding condition can be utilized on all livestock, but is only discussed with breeding animals. In market animals we would use the term leaner. Being honest in her breeding condition is considered a positive in most cases, because as animals are approaching breeding age it is known that the heavier conditioned or fatter they are the harder it becomes to get them bred on time. However, it is also important to remember that if an animal's harder shallower body type has made them not as efficient and consequently thinner and honest in her condition, then it could become a negative, because it means that animal is not as practical and could be harder to keep in proper flesh once turned out.

The term **deep chested** is discussed most commonly in cattle, sheep, and goats. It is generally a negative to be deeper chested, primarily because it just throws the animals balance off from the side. An animal can be deeper chested for a variety of reasons. 1. Because they just deposited more fat through their chest floor. 2. Because their breast plate is pushed forward and inevitably caused them to be deeper chested. Again, both scenarios are considered negative from an ascetic perspective, but, in hindsight, have nothing to do with the functionality of said livestock.

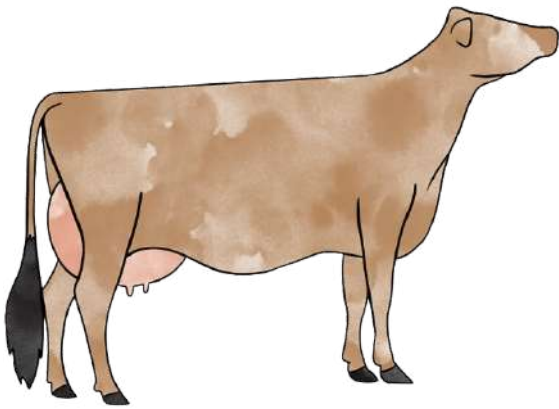

Hosting 4-H Meetings in Light of COVID-19

The health and safety of all 4-H members, volunteers, parents, guests, and staff is the top priority of the Wyoming 4-H Program. To help reduce the risks associated with the spread of COVID-19, the following guidelines from the Wyoming Department of Health and the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) should be followed to protect yourself and others.

- Stay home when sick and avoid contact with other people unless you need medical attention.
- Follow common-sense steps such as washing your hands often and well; covering your coughs and sneezes; and cleaning and disinfecting.
- If soap and water are not readily available, use a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.
- Avoid close contact with people by staying at least 6 feet apart.
- Wear cloth face coverings in public settings where social distancing is difficult to maintain.

To help safeguard the health and safety of our members and volunteers, the following guidelines need to be followed for all 4-H meetings.

Before Your 4-H meeting:

- Ensure that no more than ____ people are in attendance. The number needs to include everyone (volunteers, parents, members, siblings, guest speakers, etc.)
- Inform all possible participants to stay home if they are experiencing any of the symptoms of COVID-19 or have had known contact with anyone with COVID-19 in the last 14 days.
- Inform all possible attendees to stay home if they are considered at high risk themselves or if they live or work with individuals at high risk. (age 65+, are immunocompromised, or have other health factors identified by the CDC that increase risk if being exposed)
- Create and prepare any signs or documents that will be used at the event communicating procedures like, checking in, information for parents, expected times, etc.
- Wipe down all common surfaces as recommended by the Center for Disease Control (CDC). Common surfaces include tables, counters, doorknobs, light switches, countertops, handles, phones, keyboards, toilets, faucets, chairs, etc.

When everyone arrives:

- Have a “check-in” process in place and follow it - include providing hand-washing location, hand sanitizer, and directions for where to wait until activity starts to ensure practicing social distancing, etc.
- Take attendance. Be sure to write down the names of EVERYONE that attended and the date.

During the 4-H meeting:

- Maintain social distancing (6 feet) throughout the meeting or activity by households. You may need to be creative with different ice-breaker activities, roll-calls, etc.
- Ensure a protocol is in place and followed for use of any type of equipment. This may require planning of sanitizing equipment between uses. This is especially important for shared equipment like sewing machines, firearms, clippers, pencils, crayons, etc.

After the 4-H meeting:

- Have activities ready for individual youth to do while awaiting their pick-up. These could be handouts, games, etc, that don't involve contact with each other.
- Wipe down all common surfaces with a disinfectant as recommended by the Center for Disease Control (CDC). Common surfaces include tables, counters, doorknobs, light switches, countertops, handles, phones, keyboards, toilets, faucets, chairs, etc.

Preparing facilities for a 4-H meeting:

- Ensure that the size of the room or facility is large enough to allow for the number of expected attendees and in accordance with current Health Orders and County guidelines, this includes space to allow for social distancing.
- Space tables, chairs, shooting points, etc. farther apart to ensure social distancing (at least 6ft. apart).
- Wipe down all common surfaces as recommended by the Center for Disease Control (CDC). Common surfaces include tables, counters, doorknobs, light switches, countertops, handles, phones, keyboards, toilets, faucets, chairs, etc.

Should you have food at your meeting?

- At this time we recommend food or snacks not be provided as part of 4-H meetings. If you feel you need to provide food or snacks, please communicate with your 4-H educator on recommended safety protocols.

Summary

As a volunteer, your health and that of our youth members is of utmost importance and as such some engagement may be minimized at the request of a UW employee or UW 4-H Volunteer based on a health concerns associated with COVID-19.

By following the above best practices, we hope to offer more opportunities for youth to interact face-to-face within the parameters provided by your county health officials. If you have any questions, please contact your UW 4-H Educator for assistance or clarification.

Wyotana – Highway clean up cancelled. Will meet 5/4/21. Will not meet June, July, August. Carnival dunk tank and 70 foot obstacle course.

TRR – Met and made Mother's Day cards. Hwy clean up date changed due to weather. Carnival discussion and sign up sheet.

Critters, Crafts and Cooking – Met 4/17/21 and finished Dumbo themed carnival game. Planted seeds and cooperated with 'grow a little extra' and will go to the Community Garden and got a should

Lucky 7 – Met in April, finalizing carnival plans Mighty Duck hockey puck game. Community service 5/21 highway clean up planned and 6/21 will be at 4H camp repairing the gateway entrance and staying up at the camp.

Jr Leaders – Met 4/21 and discussed clover buddies, goal to reach out to newest members for project areas. Next meeting discussing Mountain Camp help. Will be serving 5/19/21 at 1st National Bank customer appreciation food venue, fundraiser for Jr Leaders. Plannin' for Pig Pickin' in June, more to come on this!

Old Business:

King Ropes Hats Fundraiser – Going very well, we paid Big Horn Design \$1300 for 100 hats; received \$325 from online sales and collected \$1600 for sold hats. Have 13 left to sell and 12 on hold. Successful fundraiser for council.

Raffle drawing Update – we bought 9200 tickets and sold 7420 this year (1780 unsold); 7100 sold in 2019. More tickets were bought due to 'cushion' desired and demand; discussion the council decision was made to order 7500 and then this was changed and therefore leftover unsold tickets.

Clubs need to tell about how many tickets they want. Members will be responsible for selling tickets they take or giving tickets back to office by a deadline if not sold or be responsible for money turned in, will need to CLEARLY communicate this expectation next year and date.

Pros: good to have raffle and carnival separate, easier on the office and leaders

Comments from kids: frustrated to have to sell raffle tickets, want more time to sell (3 weeks to sell was given this year), club leaders be responsible vs. families pick up at the office.

Ideas: clubs responsible for securing a big ticket item and find a donor instead of supplying a basket. Maybe a different fundraiser?

Organization is the biggest hang up every year and we need to determine how to solve this going forward. Accountability is a big theme each year, goal to teach kids life lessons and learning. Option of a potential online auction, ticket sales, raffle? Emily will research and bring back to council.

Proposal to change to paying the Top 4 High Individual 4H member sellers, including Clover Buds (ages 5-18); \$50/40/30/20. Families are not eligible, only individual sellers. Barb moved, Melissa 2nd – APPROVED

Discussion: Value of the baskets needs to be \$150 to \$200 – will be discussed more. This past year the value was at least \$100.

Proposal to sell books of 10 tickets for \$20 or \$2/ticket; Suzie moved, Heidi 2nd – APPROVED

New Business:

Indoor Committee: Showcase Showdown went well, was fun. 5 families participated. Next year proposal for having in Feb instead of May, earlier in the year. No other updates.

Awards Committee: next meeting is 5/10/21

Western Heritage Meats offered to let members tour their facility- See Cori.

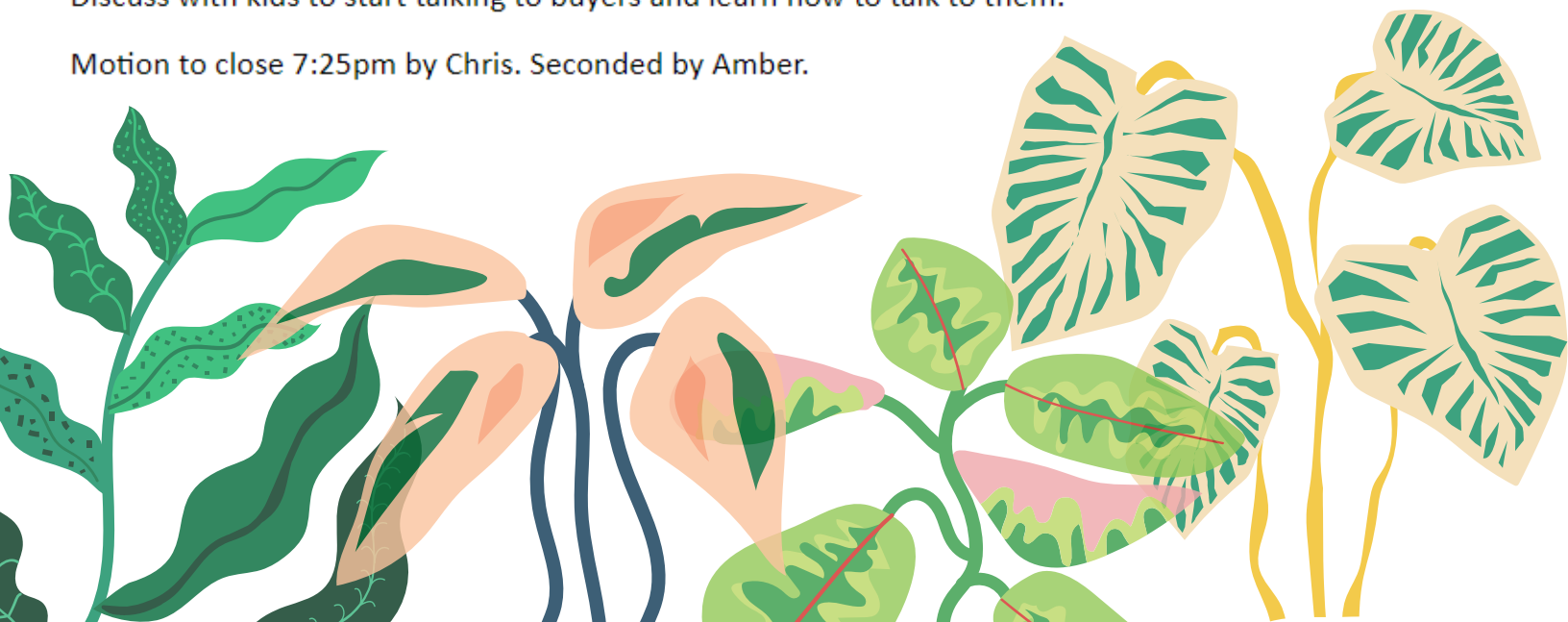
