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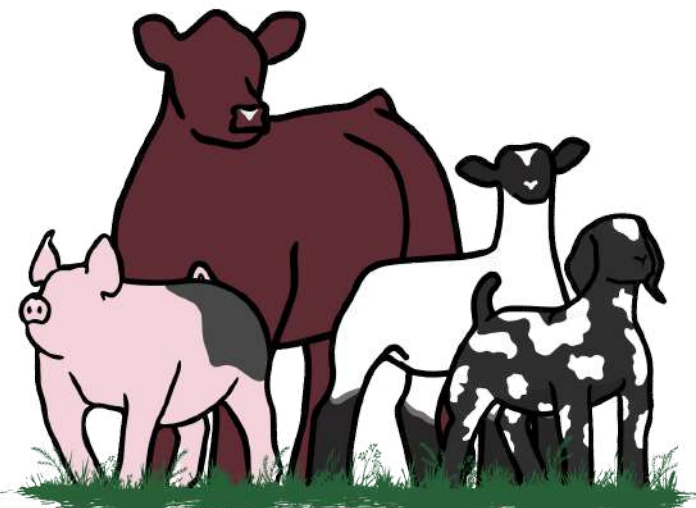


# FIRST YEAR IN 4-H?



*Here's some survival tips for market projects:*

- Get your project leaders cell phone numbers and put them in your phone. Project leaders are very helpful. Keep in touch with them if you will be missing classes or meetings, just to let them know in case they are planning something based on numbers of attendees.
- There generally are families that have walked through the project that can provide pointers, items to buy, recommendations of things that can only ease your experience. Some families have extra items you can borrow as well.
- Keep track of things along the way. Your child will be required to fill out a Record Book after fair that will be due sometime in the beginning of September. The Record Book is filled out ONLINE and submitted through that platform. You will not turn anything physical in.
- Journal costs for feed, vet bills, supplies, and equipment along the way for your record books.
- Take pictures along the journey to submit with your Record Book. You may have difficulty with picture size with submission online, so be aware it could be the picture size.

- Farmers Coop allows kids to open a 4H account where the child can charge their feed throughout the project without paying. When the animal is sold and if the child can pay their bill in full, they will receive a percentage off the bill and all service fees waved.



- You animals will be **REQUIRED** to have a designated 4H ear tag for their animal **ISSUED** by 4H to sell in the sale. They have tagging times at the fairgrounds
- Your child will be given opportunities to attend project related classes throughout the spring regarding their market animal, from how to feed, show, clean, groom and what items to buy. If you are still curious about things, **ASK**.

- The children are REQUIRED to go out and speak to the public about their market animals and invite them to the show and sale. This is an extremely important part of the process for 4H. 4H will often arrange a time for children to go together, sometime the week before the fair, when they will go out and speak to businesses all around town. Whether your child goes solo or in the group, this is MANDATORY.
- Throughout fair and the market sale, remind children to be respectful of the grounds, throw away trash, uphold good behaviors, be respectful and polite to all people on the grounds. We never know when buyers are walking amongst us, and need to show off not only the animals, but ourselves and 4H as a community organization.
- Kids will be asked to clean up the fairgrounds before the fair begins (organize pens and getting grounds ready to house animals). Kids will be asked again to clean up the grounds especially around the sale ring the day of the market sale. It will be at that time kids will also participate in hanging banners and getting the sale ring prepped with sponsors information and recognition.
- The Sale: The sale is ran based on the Champion, Reserve and higher placing animals selling first. The other animals will sell based on random draws. Do not worry where your child places in the order. Buyers are there and will support these kids if we as families do our part to educate the public on what these kids have worked hard to show to the community.
- Payout: Your children will not receive their payment of sales money until mid to end of September. This is because of the thorough process of thanking the buyers. Children will be required by 4H to handwrite thank you cards that will be turned into the Extension Office sometime in early September. You as a family have the option to take your own thank you cards right after the sale to your buyers as well as those that will be sent out to them. We can not tell our community thank you enough and show our gratitude for their graciousness.
  - When buyers' plaques are ready, your child will be required to visit their buyers again and take a photo of themselves handing the buyer their plaque. Those proof in photo must be shared with the Extension Office to show that the exchange was done.
  - As a parent you will make multiple trips to the Extension Office throughout this time.
  - At that time, the checks will be released to the child.

# 29 MAKE IT: Spoon Fishing Lure

## What you will need:

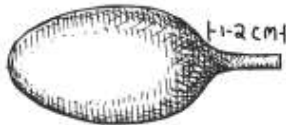
- Plastic spoon
- Acrylic paint
- Paintbrush
- Two slip loops
- Swivel
- Hook
- Drill and drill bit
- Saw

## Steps:

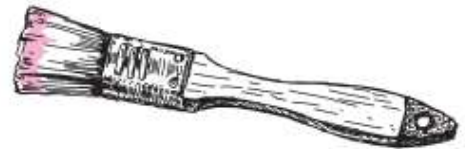
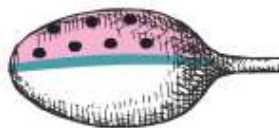
**Step 1:** Make sure to involve an adult while you are making your spoon lure! The drill and saw should only be used by adults or with adult supervision.



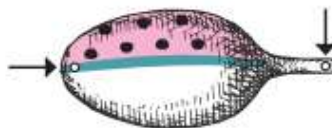
**Step 2:** Use a saw to cut the handle off the plastic spoon, leaving 1-2 cm of the handle intact.



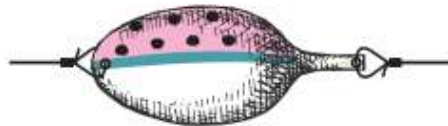
**Step 3:** Paint the spoon! You can get really creative here. Try making your spoon look like the shell of a beetle, using reflective or glittery paint or imitating other spoon lures you see online or in your tacklebox.



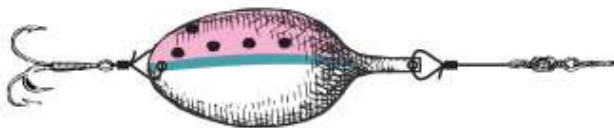
**Step 4:** Drill a small hole towards the end of what is left of the handle, and the end of the bowl.



**Step 5:** Thread a slip loop into each of the holes you have drilled.



**Step 6:** Attach the swivel to the loop on the handle end and the hook to the hole in the bowl.



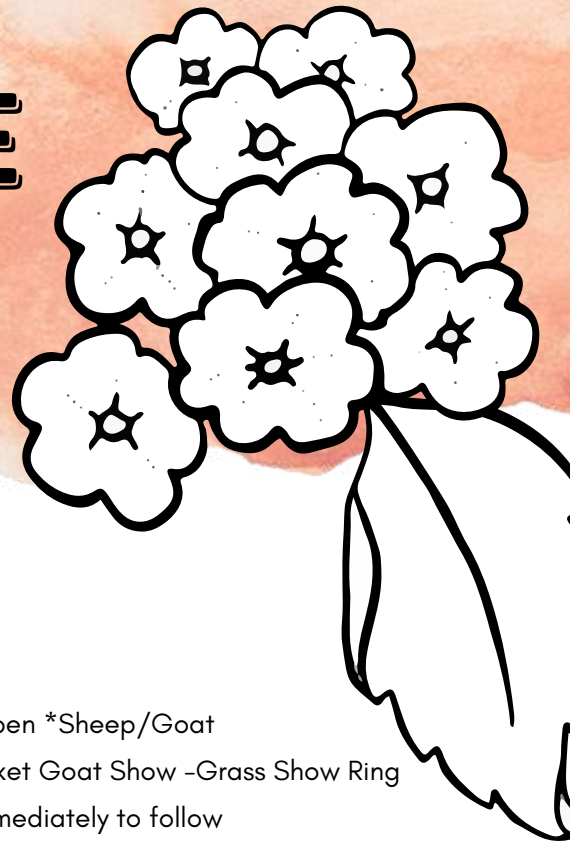
**Step 7:** Try out your new fishing spoon!

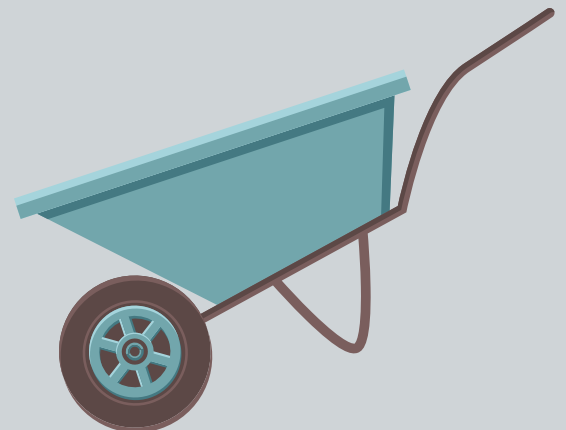

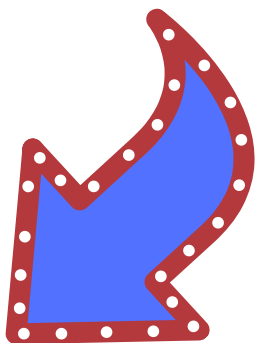

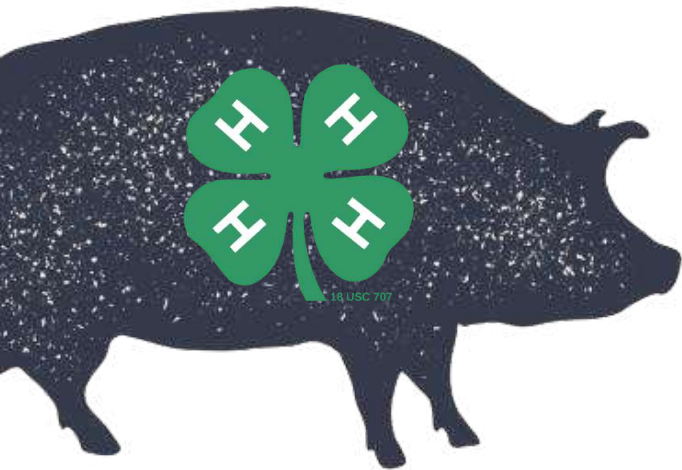

## 6/6/2022 4-H Council Meeting Minutes

The meeting was called to order at 5:48 pm by Chandra Hendricks at the Extension Office.

**Secretary Report:** Minutes were sent out from 5/3/22 meeting and included in the April Newsletter. There were no corrections to the minutes. Barb moved to approve the secretary report, Bailey seconded and motion carried.

**Treasure Report:** Balance is \$25,630.72. The total amount of the checks that have not cleared is \$2,030.33 so the actual balance is \$23,600.39. Melissa Murray motioned to approve the treasures report. Amber seconded, motion carried. There was an outstanding bill to reimburse Heidi Justus \$1,500 for the horse camp that was held in May. Heidi received an \$1100 donation to the camp but the check is was made out to the Council so that check will be deposited.
