SUPREME EWE PROGRAM

Ensure you are completing the correct phase book.

Record Books are due at the time of entry into the Sheridan County Fair.

Incomplete record books will receive an automatic 0 score.

RULES and GUIDELINES

1. The Supreme Ewe Program is open to all active 4-H and FFA members who reside in Sheridan County
2. Members must declare ownership and complete Supreme Ewe entry form no later than the June 1st deadline.
3. Completed record books (obtained at weigh-ins, online, or at the extension office) will be due on July 23rd. The judges will need adequate time to judge them prior to the county fair. Record books must be handwritten in black ink or typed on a computer.
4. Age Requirements: Phase 1 ewe must be at least 1 year old by June 1st and had no prior freshenings. Phase 2 ewes **must** have completed Phase 1 the previous year and be shown with a lamb at side.
5. Phase 1 and Phase 2 pairs **must** have the Sheridan County Supreme Contest ear tags put in place by superintendents by June 1st as well as a USDA scrapie tag/tattoo.
6. The supreme ewe class and breeding market lamb are different classes. However, ewes from the supreme ewe program **must be** entered in both breeding classes as well as the supreme ewe class. Projects must be fitted accordingly based on breed, age, production, etc.
7. If your project animal dies, contact the extension office immediately. Members are still a participant in the contest but will not receive scores for live show points.
8. Personal interviews and record book review will be held in July. Live placing will be held during the fair. A judges panel will be made up of appropriate local individuals. Members will be notified of the time and place of the interviews.
9. Interview questions may be asked about feed costs, types, cost of grain, management techniques, goals, difficulties, wool production, lambing, docking, meat production, and any other areas of interest that the judges may wish to pursue.
10. Pens must be maintained through fair week. Clean bedding, fresh water and feed should be available

Category Explanations:

Immunizations and Vaccinations: These vaccinations are yearly vaccinations given to ewes and/or rams to maintain herd health. (Ex: C&D Toxoid)

Parasite Control/Deworming: These items are used to either treat/prevent parasites both internally and externally in your flock. These can include: Topical, dip, spray, ointments, injectable.

Preventative Medications: These medications are used to help treat or prevent some common issues seen in sheep flocks. These can include treatments for sore mouth, urinary calculi, pneumonia, etc.
