



November: Pumpkin Spice Muffins

Recipe Ingredients:

- 1¼ cups whole-wheat flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 2 teaspoons cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 1 cup pumpkin puree (canned pumpkin for pie filling)
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 2 Tablespoons canola oil

Directions:

- 1. Preheat oven to 375°F.
- 2. Mix together flour, baking powder, cinnamon, nutmeg, and baking soda in a medium bowl.
- 3. Combine remaining ingredients in a large bowl. Slowly add dry ingredients to the large bowl and fold ingredients together until blended. Do not over mix.
- 4. Pour the batter into 18 non-stick muffin cups (or use paper liners) and bake for about 22 minutes, or until done.
- 5. Remove muffins from pan and let cool completely.



Preparing your for small livestock for colder weather



While it's true that most livestock are pretty hardy, extreme winter conditions like the ones we experience in Wyoming, can be difficult for your furry and feathered friends to navigate. Check out the next few pages for reminders, tips, and tricks to keep your critters healthy and happy in the colder months ahead.



Keep water liquid and accessible

This can be a challenge, but it is extremely important. Try to use heated water tanks or bowls. If electricity is not accessible, replace the water multiple times a day with warm water and break out ice chunks.








While some farmers use heat lamps to keep their coops and barns warm, these come with the risk of starting fires if they malfunction, fall into shavings, or aren't properly maintained. There are other products that are safer, especially for poultry. These are products like radiant wall heaters.

Minimize Drafts

- Wind chill can increase the rate of heat loss from your barn or coop.
- Secure your animal's area in such a way that eliminates breezes
- This will help stabilize temperatures inside
- Windows also help maximize sunlight and add warmth









Ventilation

Proper ventilation is essential in preventing ammonia build up and it reduces the risk of frostbite

- Vents should be placed towards the roof of the coop/building
- By venting out the warm, moisture-laden air and replacing it with cooler, drier air, you will be able to keep the humidity down and prevent mold as well as minimize the threat of frostbite





Proper Nutrition

Regulating their body temperature in cold weather takes more energy. Be sure to give your animals enough feed to help them stay comfortable. Rolled oats and black oil sunflower seeds are high energy foods. Also high quality hay or alfalfa (depending on your species) is always an excellent choice. If you have questions about what you feed your animal, your species superintendent is an excellent resouce.


This one's for the birds ...



- Roost size is important in the prevention of frostbitten toes
- Birds should be able to nestle down and cover their feet with their downy feathers
- Around 1.5 2 inches in diameter is an adequate size for roosting bar
- Roosts should also be raised above the ground, this helps make your flock feel more secure at night

Sheridan County Livestock Committee Meeting 10.04.2023

Attendance: Joel Wardell, Melissa Petzold, Crystal Mediate, Heidi Justus, Chris Sorenson, Emily Swinyer, Chaney Peterson, Kimber Solberg, Justin West, Amber Jensen, Marci Timm Guests: Jeremy Kisling.

The Meeting was called to order at 6:03pm by Chairman Justin West at the Extension Office on 10.04.23.

Approval of the consent agenda:

- Approval of minutes from the last meeting (sent out via email)
- Project area meeting dates and time (sent out via email)
- Sale Committee Checking Account Balance: \$324806.92 with one buyer left to collect from.
 - Joel moved to approve the consent agenda Chris 2nd Amber amended the motion to add to the September minutes about how the Fairgrounds was left after County Fair. Crystal 2nd. The motion and amended motions both passed.

Old Business:

• Amber gave an update on record book submissions and plaque delivery. Everyone got their record books turned in beside the kids that are only in FFA, and their books are due 12/31/2023. Only one member did not turn in proof of delivery for their buyer plaques. The Sale Committee is sending them an email that if this not completed by 12/31/2023 the member will not be eligible to sell in the 2024 Sale.

New Business:

- 2024 Fair Schedule—July 27th through August 5th, 2024
 - There were no big changes to the dates of the shows. The sheep and goat show would like to look at restructuring the time frame of their shows. Also, we need to re-evaluate vet checks. Also discussed a way to be able to do the ultrasound all in one day. We will continue to work on this at the next meeting when more superintendents are present.
 - Kimber also thought of temporary bathroom fix for next year by moving the shower trailer down closer to the ring, so we have running water to at least wash hands.
- Follow Up Survey
 - Justin and Amber are working on more precise questions to be asked and sent out. They will try to have those out by late next week, or before the next meeting.
- Carcass Evaluation Announcement
 - Emily verified that they were announcing the top 5 places of each species at Achievement Day. Amber will ask Katie to please send the office all the carcass data.
- Superintendent Re-Elections
 - Open Positions
 - Hog Superintendents (2)
 - At the last meeting Heidi requested to have a co-Superintendent.

- Amber Motioned that we add a co horse superintendent to help Heidi. Melissa 2nd. Motion passed with a show of hands with 8 yes and 0 no.
- Wyoming Association of Fairs report from Kimber as she attended the annual convention in Cheyenne.
 - A lot of the fairs have a lot of the same issues that we do.
 - Each Fair runs a little differently.
 - We have a great sale, and it is not the longest one in the State. Other counties struggle with load out.
 - A lot of other counties use Show Works and it works better than Fair Entry in their experience.
 - Other Counties do all species vet checks.
 - Justin reported from what he had heard from people at the convention that Kimber was a great leader and represented Sheridan County in a great light at the conference.
- Fair Judges
 - Superintendents, please get those line ups early and get the names to Kimber so she can get contracts done early!
 - We will get an updated budget to the fair board by their November Meeting.
- Jeremy Kisling
 - Jeremy came before the committee to bring light to rules that fair families were being asked to follow but were not in the fair book. It is not in the fair book if hogs came in Wednesday and weighed that they must stay on the grounds. After a long discussion, it is very important superintendents read their section of the fair book to make sure everything is there. Jeremy offered to help review fair book.
- At 7:23pm Melissa motioned that the committee move into executive session Joel 2nd and by a show of hands with 8 yes votes and 0 no votes motion passed.

The committee came out of executive session at 7:39. Joel motioned to adjourn at 7:40 pm, Heidi 2nd. Meeting adjourned
